Synopsis

Anders, a freshman at the University of Michigan, is playing on the UM hockey team. He is from Sweden, and is excited about coming to UM after living for the last 3 years in Chicago with a billet family as he plays travel hockey in the USA. We follow Anders as he meets other characters such as Shantal, a UM cross-country runner, and James, a UM soccer player and his roommate.
